
Write your name

When you have completed your name, save your image in the camera roll, and add it to this journal **on the next page.**






Create a Pattern

One chicken, two eggs, one chicken, two eggs....



Take a look around you. Can you see lots of lines? What about a pattern? You might have a pattern of photos on a wall or maybe your floor is a pattern.

We're going to discover how to take a great photo but first, you'll need a grown up to come with you!






Mark it Up



Here are some ideas you might like to record:



- ▶ A toy car making a jump on a ramp.






